

In Japan, Christmas is a time for couples in love, like a second Valentine's Day. It is seen as romantic.

Bizarre Christmas traditions and folklore from around the world



Bizarre (形容): 奇妙な

Tradition (名): 伝統 Fólklore (名): 民間伝承

Around the world, there are many strange Christmas traditions. In Austria and Hungary, Santa has a demonic counterpart: Krampus. Like Santa, Krampus carries a sack, but instead of giving presents, he takes naughty children, puts them in his sack, and takes them back to hell.

Iceland has strange Christmas folklore; in particular, a family of trolls and their children. Gryla is a woman troll who cooks naughty children in a large pot. Her pet, the Yule Cat, eats people who have not received new clothes by Christmas Day.

Gryla's children are 13 mischievous boys, known as the Yule Lads. Each Yule Lad performs a specific prank on the 13 nights before Christmas Day. They do everything from stealing meat and pots, to licking spoons or slamming doors.

If children put their shoes on the window sill, the Yule Lads leave small gifts for good children, and rotten potatoes for naughty ones.

In the town of Gavle, Sweden, the townspeople build a 3-story tall goat made from straw, rope, and wood.

Strangely, there is also a tradition of townspeople trying to burn or destroy the goat. The people living there bet whether or not the goat will survive to the end of Christmas.

All countries put up decorations for Christmas, but in Germany and Spain, there are special joke decorations. In Germany, on Christmas trees, there is usually a hidden pickle decoration.

In Spain, people buy small *caganer* ('pooper') figures, which hide amongst the other normal decorations. These can be very detailed, often looking like famous people.

In Venezuela, people wear roller skates, and skate to church or around town each day leading up to Christmas. This is so popular that the government stops vehicles from using roads in the center of towns and cities.

They go from house to house, and ask to be entertained with songs, rhymes, and beer to drink.

In Wales, in the United Kingdom, there is another strange and frightening Christmas creature: Mari Lwyd, or gray mare. The Mari Lwyd is a group of people carrying a horse's skull on a stick, under a white sheet. .

In Latvia, people wear scary costumes and go from house to house, singing and performing. In return, they receive food and drinks. They are expected to stay disguised; if their identity is learned, they remove their costume and eat food with the family.

Witches are also surprisingly common in Christmas folklore. In Italy, La Befana is a kind witch who delivers presents to good children, like Santa Claus.

In Norway, witches fly around the night sky at Christmas, causing trouble. As such, people in Norway hide all their brooms, so witches cannot find and use them.

Japan has its own strange Christmas tradition. In 1974, a marketing campaign for KFC claimed that in Western countries, for Christmas, people ate fried chicken. This was a lie; people eat roast turkey or ham. However, every year, millions of Japanese people will order special Christmas set meals from KFC. And KFC mascot Colonel Sanders will be dressed as Santa Claus.

KAGAMI-MOCHI

A Japanese New Year Tradition

I want to introduce the winter tradition of kagami-mochi. The custom of offering kagami-mochi is said to have begun in the Muromachi period (1336 - 1573). On January 11th, we perform the kagami-biraki - a ceremony where the kagami-mochi is offered.

The kagami-mochi is broken apart and eaten while praying for good health and the absence of illness. It is not cut up using a knife; it is considered unlucky to point a blade at an offering. It is opened with a wooden hammer instead. The important thing is for everyone in the house to eat it, and not throw it away.
